Information sharing within partner agencies.	Strong links with CADAS are now in place, the organisation have not been established in West for some time. Through partnership working and building relationships CADAS have joined the Allerdale and Copeland Hubs since September 2019. CADAS also delivered two FREE full day training events to support this partnership, one in each area. This was gratefully received due to the scarcity of training of this nature in Cumbria. Over 40 representatives across the two hubs attended this event which was of exceptional quality. Stronger links with Unity have been made and they regularly attend case meetings and feed into the monthly partners meetings.

A multi-agency approach of targeting under age and proxy sales, educating parents in the health effects of underage drinking of alcohol and a resource intensive campaign to tackle issues of underage drinking and associated anti social behaviour at Egremont Crab Fair all resulted in positive comments received from the organisers, the Police, the Town Council and residents that the CAP approach had made a significant difference. The Copeland CAP won the national CAP Award for the Most Improved Locality.</p> <p>Millom CAP is led by CADAS and in the process of sending out questionnaires in order to collate the information on where to target resources and agree an Action Plan. There have been two meetings so far and is set to continue into 2020/21.</p> <p>Allerdale cap was started in January 2020 and it has been decided to deliver this in Maryport. It plans to build on the award winning schemes in Copeland. Due to COVID 19 this has been put on temporary hold.</p> <p>The Best Bar None scheme was introduced in March 2019 across West and north Cumbria as a joint initiative. 15 venues across our area showed an interest and 9 joined. The scheme is designed to raise standards in licensed premises and promote a safe night-time economy linked into the National scheme. The scheme was also entered into the national awards in the best new Scheme category and won in that category. The award was presented to the steering committee at the House of Lords and received excellent praise from Lord Smith of Hindhead.</p> <p>The false ID protocol was initiated across the area and this has resulted in venues submitting false or fraudulent use ID to the police. Police then make contact with the parents or owners of the ID cards and they are all warned and advised prior to having the ID cards restored.</p> <p>Currently there are 9 Pubwatch Schemes active within West Cumbria, incorporating approximately 268 licensed premises.</p> <p>During 2019-2020 there have been 39 exclusions, 10 warnings and 17 extensions to bans issued, ranging from 1 month to lifetime exclusions for a range of incidents (eg, violence, disorderly conduct, drug offences, breach of current bans etc).</p> <p>Taxi Marshalls continue to monitor individuals who are nominated to receive a warning or exclusion for their troublesome, violent and disorderly behaviour linked to the night-time economy, to ensure integrity of the scheme by continuing to exclude violent and troublesome individuals from participating premises. They ensure that current legislation is used where appropriate. Trained security staff were deployed during the Easter bank holiday weekend and during the festive period due to the increased risk of disorder during these times. The marshalls are able to make early intervention to prevent escalating disorder developing. The marshalls also direct lone individuals safely to a taxi.</p>

<p>ANTI SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR To work with partners to reduce ASB, engage with the community and deliver positive projects to address community concerns and make use of current legislation, to be delivered by the Local Focus Hubs.</p>			<p>The bulk of work around ASB is delivered through the referral processes of the two hubs. A total of 128 referrals were submitted into the Allerdale Hub and 101 were closed as completed and resolved successfully. The Copeland Hub had a total of 38 referrals with 34 closed successfully. The referrals covered all facets of ASB and included noise, neighbour disputes, youth disorder, drug misuse to name but a few problems. These problems are resolved via the strong Hub partnership links that exist. The referrals are strengthened by the Monthly partnership tasking meetings that identify priority targets, priority locations, community priorities and emerging trends. These are decided upon by the partnerships.</p> <p>The reduction in ASB reported to the police in the period was 25.5%. This is a reduction of 724 incidents across West Cumbria. The referral process has now been strengthened by it mirroring the OSARA problem solving mechanism that is the proposed processes endorsed by the College of Policing.</p>

Since relocating to Allerdale House the monthly Community Tasking report now includes data from Fire and Rescue, Home Group, Westfield Housing, Castles and Coasts, Allerdale Borough Council and Police.</p> <p>The Copeland Community Tasking report also includes data from partner agencies and forms the basis of our discussions when agreeing priority locations, priority targets, community issues and emerging trends. 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			<p>Brathay Trust have also been engaged with the hubs to deliver the Be Savy programme designed to combat child Sexual exploitation. The current scheme has 9 persons initially attending and this was curtailed due to COVID 19. This is an ongoing project that will continue through 2020.</p> <p>The Copeland Hub regularly engages with the youth providers in Copeland. Two particular streams of work have been tackling youth anti-social behaviour in Egremont which involved working closely with Egremont Youth Partnership, this work including outreach work and identifying individuals that were causing nuisance to residents and businesses and the work through the Copeland CAP. Egremont Youth Partnership received the PCC's Above and Beyond Award in recognition of their work.</p> <p>The Future Pathways programme funded by Morgan Sindall has seen another successful year. 8 students from Mayfield School completed the programme, whilst a further 12 students from Whitehaven Academy and 8 students from Westlakes Academy also graduated. Unfortunately, the cohort that was due to start at UTC in March has had to be postponed due to the Covid-19 pandemic.</p> <p>The Junior Award Scheme for Schools (JASS) entered its second year and 124 students from St James' Junior School at Whitehaven and Bookwell Primary School at Egremont received their Bronze Award certificates and badges.</p> <p>Representatives from the Copeland Hub have also visited Westlakes Academy to receive two school talks from outside agencies on topics that are current multi agency projects. Knife crime and underage drinking. This is to gauge the students' reactions to the topics and to gain a better understanding of the issues and how we can tackle them.</p>

Representatives from CADAS, Home Group, Castles and Coasts, Cumbria County Council, and IOM regularly hot desk at this facility. The benefits of this environment are in some cases intangible but very visible. Relationships are being naturally developed and problems are being solved quickly and effectively due to the right people being together in one place.</p> <p>The Copeland Hub is located in Whitehaven Police Station and is self contained with separate access for partner agencies. Regular hot desking and use of the 2 designated meeting rooms by our partner agencies ensures a regular flow of people and more importantly information which is key to collaborative working.
